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I. Exploring Adverse Childhood Experiences as Predictors for Substance Use and Mental Health Disorders Robert C. Duckworth, Director of Counseling, Dallas Theological Seminary

In criminal justice settings across the State of Texas, it is imperative for clinical professionals and referring probation personnel to understand the impact of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) on substance use in adulthood. This presentation unveils the results of recent doctoral research related to high prevalence of ACEs across diverse community sizes and the relationship between childhood mobility and ACEs among adults enrolled in a community substance use program.

II. Probation Officer Safety Training: Field/Home Safety Training

Leo Perez, Jr., Assistant Supervisor, Hidalgo County CSCD

This program is designed to provide probation officers with tips for field / home safety. As we all know probation provides an alternative to incarceration, and consequently the home becomes a focal point for adjustment to anyone who is experiencing community supervision for the first time. A strong family and stable home environment goes hand in hand with the treatment needs of any defendant. As each passing year comes and goes the field of probation becomes more and more advance in treatment assistance and monitoring. One of the most critical tools a probation officer has at his or her disposal are home visits. Conducting home visits offers a probation officer a unique opportunity to discover a defendant's adjustment to community supervision. Home visits are a critical tool in case management for all probation officers. Each home visit however can expose a probation officer to hazardous situations. Probation officers can benefit from old and new techniques that will make their safety in the field a priority. Field / Home Safety Training will expose probation officers to areas of concern as well as new and up to date information from law enforcement agencies that are critical in ensuring a safe return back to the office. It will allow probation officers to see how to reduce the hazards of filed / home visits and provide an outline of proper safety techniques to implement in the event that single or partner field visits are conducted. This presentation will provide probation officers with a general understanding of each officer's responsibilities during and after a field / home visit. It will also bring guidance and preparation skills prior to conducting field / home visits. It is a step forward in ensuring safety in the field of probation. P.O.S.T is designed to bring training to the field of probation, by a member of the same profession, because as the P.O.S.T motto says, "We are each other's greatest teachers."

III. Excited Delirium

I. Hijacked-Adolescent Brain and Treatment for Substance Use

The adolescent brain is complex and is still developing. As the teenager's brain is still growing there are many things to consider, especially if the child is using drugs. There are many physical and psychological symptoms associated with using substances. It can be a struggle for teenagers to find sobriety/recovery and they often cycle through the Stages of Change. This is a time for intervention and treatment, what options are available to treating substance use disorder.

This training will provide an orientation on several of the modern covert weapons that are currently out on the market today. The training class is designed to introduce Probation Officers and Community Corrections personnel with a general overview of the weapons, in an effort to increase office and field safety. The presentation is designed to provide officers with visual aids and information on some of the weapons that have been located by law enforcement agencies within the United States. As each passing years comes and goes, covert weapons change and become more modern. This presentation will expose participants to this growing area of concern, in an effort to help ensure a safe working environment. It will allow participants to see how these items transform into hazardous life threating weapons. As we all know criminals who cannot purchase firearms will arm themselves by any means necessary. Drug Trends, Mexican Drug Cartels and Patron Saints of Narco Traffickers

This presentation will discuss all of the current drug trends, being those from the Mexican Cartels ie; cocaine, methamphetamine, heroin, fentynal and counterfeit prescription drugs, to the synthetics being shipped to the US from China. We will then see how to manufacture methamphetamine and how to convert it from liquid into crystal form, which is the main way the cartels are getting the methamphetamine into to US. The next part of the class is Narco Saints, being Santa Muerta and Jesus Malverde and how these saints are prayed to by criminals. We will then talk about the Mexican Drug Cartels and which ones are in control of what parts of Mexico and what states they control in the US for Drug Distribution. Lastly, we will cover Overdose investigations and how the drug dealers in these cases can be arrested and prosecuted.
