## I. At the Crossroads of Vulnerability & Shame

Description: Based on the research of Brene Brown, Ph.D., the participant will learn the difference between guilt and shame. The participant will learn the connections between trauma, the need for vulnerability and criminal justice. The participant will be introduced to engagement skills strategies to assist offenders to hold on to their capacity for vulnerability in order to find positive experiences in their lives.

# II. Besides Opioids, What Other Drugs Do We See on the Streets?

There are many dangerous drugs out there that are not opioids, and this session will address these. Methamphetamines will be particularly covered since more people die related to methamphetamine in Texas than opioids! Other novel drugs will also be covered, including synthetic cannabinoids, synthetic cathinones (bath salts) and hallucinogens.

#### III. Recognizing and Dealing with Excited Delirium

This course will provide the participant with details on how to recognize and deal with people who are suffering from Excited Delirium. Often times, people deal with other people who are suffering from Excited Delirium, and do you realize what they are seeing. This course will help you recognize the signs and symptoms that you might be missing. Further it will cover what causes Excited Delirium, as well as what drugs often cause Excited Delirium. This course will address policies that may or may not be in place, and if it is worth losing your job over not paying attention to the little signs of Excited Delirium, until it has transformed into a life or death situation. Does the Taser work and are the restraints being used properly, will also be discussed.

## **Patron Saints of the Mexican Drug Underworld**

Robert Almonte

Drug and human traffickers, gang members and others involve the spiritual world in their trade for protection from law enforcement. This intensive course will include information on various legitimate and illegitimate saints and icons used by criminals.

Embedded in the traditions and culture of the Hispanic community are legitimate Catholic saints that the faithful pray to for protection and/or assistance such as St. Jude (patron saint of impossible causes) and San Ramon (patron saint of silence). Some of the legitimately recognized Catholic saints are also used by drug traffickers for "protection" from law enforcement. There are still other unrecognized saints or spirits that drug traffickers and others have adopted and use to protect them from law enforcement in their illegal activities. They include Jesus Malverde (patron saint of drug traffickers); San Simon and Santa Muerte. Santa Muerte's popularity in the United States has become increasingly alarming and has been associated with violent crimes.

Instructor Robert Almonte has visited several shrines in Mexico and the United States and will display photos and video as well as paraphernalia that drug traffickers may have had in their possession. Although these items are not probable cause for search or arrest, this course serves to educate and alert law enforcement officials as to their significance, thereby enhancing officer safety. The presence of drug saints, spirits, images, icons, statutes, etc. may be overlooked by law enforcement. Mr. Almonte's course serves to educate and alert law enforcement officials to their significance, thereby enhancing officer safety. Robert has testified in State and Federal Court on drug trafficking cases involving various icons being used by drug traffickers.

This unique course is extremely beneficial to law enforcement officers, correction officers, probation and parole officers, and crime analysts in all parts of the country who may encounter images, icons, statutes, and other items during or pursuant to an investigation. Several significant arrests, including the clearing of a cold case murder investigation, as well as drug and money seizures throughout the country have been attributed to this course and are discussed during the presentation.
