Our Mission

The mission of the Crime Victims' Institute is to:

Dr. Miltonette Olivia Craig is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Criminal Justice and Criminology at Sam Houston State University. Previously, she was a faculty member in the Department of Criminal Justice Sciences at Illinois State University. She earned her J.D. from Georgia State University College of Law and Ph.D. in Criminology and Criminal Justice from Florida State University. Dr. Craig's research examines race and gender across criminal legal institutions, such as disparities in traffic stops and community supervision decision-making.



Her work also examines intersectionality and intimate partner violence. Her work has been published in peer-reviewed journals such as Victims and Offenders, Crime and Delinquency, Criminal Justice Review, and Policing: An International Journal. She has contributed to discussions on system reform in the Chicago Tribune and Houston Chronicle, as well as on Illinois Public Radio and Texas Standard Radio. At SHSU, Dr. Craig teaches Fundamentals of Criminal Law, Legal Aspects of Criminal Justice, Seminar in American Courts, and the Ethics of Criminal Justice. Dr. Craig is excited to take on her new role as CVI Research Coordinator. She truly appreciates CVI's support of her victimology work, and shares its dedication to promoting scholarly research that centers the experiences of victim-survivors and aids in the provision and improvement of services.

April 21-27 is National Crime Victims' Rights Week (NCVRW)


