New Addition to the CVI Team

Graduate Research Assistant: Akiura Kelly began the master's program in the Department of Victim Studies at Sam Houston State University in the Fall of 2021. She received a B.S. in Victim Studies with a minor in Forensic Science in May of 2021 at SHSU. She also received an A.A. in Interdisciplinary Studies from Central Texas College in Killeen, TX in May of 2019. In addition to joining the CVI team, she works as a Residential Advocate at SAAFE House in Huntsville, TX. Her research interests are in family violence and the psychological impact resulting from participating in assistance programs.

New Research Coordinator

Dr. Breanna Boppre is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Victim Studies at Sam Houston State University. Previously, she was a faculty member in the School of Criminal Justice at Wichita State University. Recognized as an outstanding graduate, she earned her Ph.D. in Criminology and Criminal Justice from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas in 2018. Dr. Boppre's research assesses how victimization and trauma lead to system-involvement. She critically examines the impacts of legal and carceral responses to victimization. Her research appears in numerous top peer-reviewed outlets including Justice Quarterly, Criminal Justice and Behavior, Feminist Criminology, the International



Journal of Offender Therapy and Comparative Criminology, Corrections: Policy, Practice, and Research, and Victims & Offenders. Her early work received the American Society of Criminology Division on Women and Crime (DWC) graduate student paper award and she recently was recognized as the DWC New Scholar Award recipient. Beyond her research, Dr. Boppre is an award-winning innovative educator. She has been recognized by the ASC Division of Victimology as 2021 Faculty Teacher of the Year and by ACJS with the 2022 Ken Peak Innovations in Teaching Award. She often engages students in service-learning projects to help the campus and local community. Dr. Boppre's service work is focused on mentorship, pedagogy, inclusivity, and community engagement. She is actively involved in several national organizations in leadership roles. She also delivers numerous trainings, workshops, and webinars using interactive and engaging presentation techniques to connect her scholarship to the public.

Since coming to SHSU in Fall of 2021, Dr. Boppre has helped organize campus events, cultivated new community partners, and started innovative research projects here in Texas. Dr. Boppre recently won an internal grant to examine the implications of COVID-19 for prison conditions and reentry in Texas.

Dr. Boppre is very excited to take on her new role as Research Coordinator for CVI.

Texas Victim Services Association Annual Symposium

On October 27th and 28th, 2022, in College Station, Texas, the Texas Victim Services Association (TVSA) will host their 2022 research symposium [1] titled From Theory to Practice: Victimization, Justice, and Healing. This two-day event provides an opportunity for researchers and practitioners to discuss trauma-informed and survivor-centered practices and responses in different settings and disciplines. Workshops are designed to inform victim advocates, law enforcement, members of the judicial process, and mental health service providers.
